

Distribution By Metropolitan Statistical Area (MSA)

Table 4 of Appendix A summarizes the 15 MSAs in Pennsylvania and includes Pike County, which is part of the New York City, New York MSA. A total of 33 counties are involved. Counties in New Jersey which are part of the Philadelphia MSA are not included in this report.

The highest Crime Index rates in 2010 were experienced in the Philadelphia MSA (3,196.6 per 100,000 population) and Allen-Beth-Easton MSA (2,723.2 per 100,000 population). The lowest Crime Index rate occurred in the Scranton-Wilkes-Barre MSA (1,639.7 per 100,000 population).

Generally, Crime Index rates within core cities of the MSAs are higher than rates in their suburbs. Listed below are the core cities with the highest rates and their corresponding suburban rates (rates shown are per 100,000 population):

In 2010, 11 MSAs showed decreases and 4 MSAs showed increases in Crime Index offenses. The Williamsport MSA showed the largest increase, 6.5 percent, from 2,396 offenses the previous year to 2,552 in 2010. The State College MSA showed the largest decrease, 9.0 percent, from 2,913 offenses the previous year to 2,650 in 2010.

Pennsylvania MSA Crime Index offenses decreased by 1.0 percent in 2010 compared to the previous year. MSA core city jurisdictions increased by .9 percent; MSA suburban jurisdictions decreased by 2.5 percent; rural jurisdictions decreased by 3.0 percent; and non-MSA jurisdictions decreased by 2.1 percent during this period.
